Summer officially came to an end on September 22, 2017. With the end of summer means the students are back in the full swing of school. 100+ new books, 24 teen and elementary magazines, 3 daily newspapers and 4 weekly newspapers as well as the entire book collection are available to the students.

Book browsing for 7-12 students is available each day before school until the end of the school day. K-6 grades are at the library 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> periods so library availability is limited at this time.

The elementary grades are scheduled each week for checkout, library skills (for example, the intermediate grades are exploring the multitude of genres), read aloud time, and quiet reading time.

Some weeks adjustments are made if a seasonal activity is planned. For example, Get Into Gear With Reading is our kickoff theme this year at the library. This will be a really BIG gear when completed with titles just read this fall.

The kindergarten class is coming for story time as well as preparing to checkout books. These children are busy learning book handling and book selection skills. The first checkout is scheduled for this Wednesday, October 4<sup>th</sup>.

Elementary grades have scheduled library days as follows:

- Kindergarten – Wednesday
- Grade 1 – Friday
- Grade 2 – Monday
- Grade 3 – Thursday
- Grade 4 – Monday
- Grade 5 – Tuesday
- Grade 6 – Thursday

Please assist your elementary child in responsibly returning books and magazines. Mark your calendar for library day.

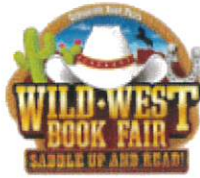

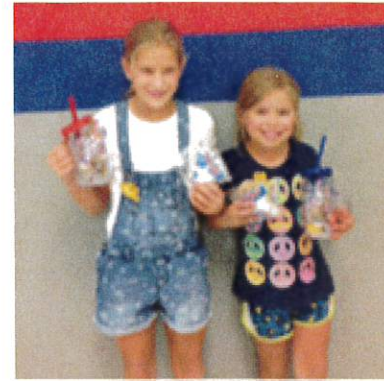




Howdy Pardners,

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## It's FAFSA time!

Beginning October 1, you and your parents can complete the 2018-19 [FAFSA](#) (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The FAFSA is the application for state, federal, and college-based financial aid.

Follow these tips to prepare:

**Create a Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID** for you and one for a parent at [fsaid.ed.gov](https://fsaid.ed.gov). You and a parent will each need an FSA ID to access and sign the FAFSA.

**Attend an EducationQuest Financial Aid Program (FAP)** to learn about the FAFSA and the financial aid process. If you attend, *you'll be eligible to register for a [\\$500 scholarship!](#)* FAPs are happening at high schools across the state. [Click here](#) for dates and locations.

**Review the [FAFSA Checklist](#)** at EducationQuest.org to determine items you'll need to complete the FAFSA.

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## Winning the scholarship game

Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships:

**Don't pay for scholarship services!** Free resources include [ScholarshipQuest](http://ScholarshipQuest) at EducationQuest.org, your school counselor's office, and EducationQuest offices in Omaha, Lincoln, and Kearney.

**Focus on college-based and local scholarships.** You're more likely to earn them over large national awards.

**Continually update your activities, honors, and volunteer or paid jobs** using the [Activities Resume](http://ActivitiesResume) at EducationQuest.org.

**Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores** by taking the exams in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.

**Use quality references** such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Give them advance notice, a specific deadline, and a copy of your Activities Resume.

**Ask at least two people** to proofread your application.
