EducationQuest - College Planning Bulletin

It's FAFSA Time!

If you're a college-bound senior, you must complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) if you wish to be considered for state, federal and college-based financial aid. Submit the form before your college's FAFSA priority date (typically between March 1st and April 1st) as some financial aid is awarded first-come, first-served. Check with your college to learn their specific date.

Follow these steps to complete the FAFSA:

(1) Complete your taxes early as the FAFSA requires current tax information. Within three weeks after you and your parents file your tax forms, your IRS data should be available to retrieve and transfer into your

FAFSA through the IRS Data Retrieval process.

- (2) Gather these student and parent items:
 - 2014 federal income tax forms and, if applicable, Schedule K-1 (Form 1065)
 - 2014 W-2 forms
 - Student's driver's license number
 - Social Security numbers
 - Birth dates
 - Date parents were married, separated, divorced or widowed
 - Current cash, savings and checking account balances
 - Current investment values (stocks, bonds, mutual funds, CDs, etc.) excluding your home and retirement accounts
 - Value of business (if more than 100 employees)
 - Value of investment farm (Do not include the value of a family farm that you or your parents live on and operate)
 - 2014 child support (paid and/or received)
 - 2014 Workers' Compensation
 - Other untaxed income in 2014 such as housing/food/living allowances for military and clergy
 - Alien Registration Number for eligible non-citizens
- (3) Be prepared to answer the following FAFSA question:

Did you or anyone in your household receive any of the following federal benefits?

- Supplemental Security Income
- SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program)
- TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families)
- Free or Reduced Price Lunch
- WIC (Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children)
- (4) Complete and file the FAFSA at www.FAFSA.gov The colleges you list on the application will receive the results and then determine awards.





It Matters: Motivation

Motivation tools that work: goals, talks & teachers



People do their best work when they are self-motivated. That is, when the desire to achieve comes from

within them, not because someone has threatened a punishment or even dangled a reward in front of them.

But many middle school students still need help becoming motivated when it comes to schoolwork. So be your child's partner in this effort. Here's how:

- Create a list of goals. Your child should list each of his classes, and next to each of them, a goal. What grade would he like to see on his next report card? Encourage him to aim high but be realistic.
- Have a daily talk. Use the goal list as a conversation starter. Ask your child questions such as, "Is there homework in the class? Did you turn in today's homework? When is the next test, quiz or project? Did you get any tests or quizzes back?"
- Stay in touch with teachers.
 Request their input on how your child is doing. Emphasize to your child that he, you and the school are in a three-way partnership. It is important for your child to know you and his teachers care deeply about his success. Having caring partners promotes motivation. Thinking no one cares promotes discouragement.



Inspire your middle schooler with a bit of guidance & love

Want to send your child to school ready and eager to learn each day? Let her know that you've got her back! In other words, make sure she feels loved and supported at home.

According to research, kids who enjoy strong relationships with adults:

- Feel safer and have a sunnier outlook than kids who don't.
- Are less likely than other kids to cheat on a test.
- Feel healthier and happier than other kids.
- Believe they'll succeed in the future
- Are nine times likelier than other kids to earn straight A's in school. What's the best way to show your child your love? When asked in a survey, students said they'd like their parents to:
- Take an interest in schoolwork.
- Really listen when they have something to say.



- Meet their teachers and learn about their classes.
- · Stop comparing them to others.
- · Be good role models.
- Spend more time together just having fun as a family.
- · Avoid lecturing about mistakes.
- · Treat them with respect.
- Encourage them to do well in school and elsewhere.
- · Set reasonable rules and limits.
- Notice when they do things right.
- Offer guidance.

Studies show that students are more motivated to learn when they are actively engaged in that learning.

And one of the best ways to engage them is by using technology.

When your child is studying, she can type vocabulary words and their definitions on a computer. When she has a reading assignment, she can use a tablet to type her notes.

And if your child has a project, she can head to the library and use the Internet to do research. When your child uses technology to gather data, experts say she:

- Improves her ability to analyze facts and predict outcomes.
- · Becomes a "real-world" learner.
- Sharpens problem-solving skills.
