News and Notes from the Social Science Department By Bob McEvoy

The Third Quarter has been an awesome time here in the Social Science Department of Clarkson Public School. Here are a few of our highlights from early 2019:

-<u>American History</u>- This class has spending a significant amount of time exploring the events and the brave men and women who preserved our American way of life during WWII. The students will soon understand that the following "Cold War" period may turn out to be the most dangerous period of American History yet. We will then move through the wars, conflicts and social change that shaped 20th Century and the new millennium.

-<u>7th Grade Civics</u>- This group has been given an introductory look into our country, our government, and our uniquely American way of life. There is an emphasis on patriotism, civic duty, and the rights and responsibilities of being a citizen of the United States, while also learning the basic foundations of how the Constitution and Democracy affect our everyday lives with the 27 Amendments and the role of the Three Branches of Government.

-<u>American Government</u>- This upper level course is taught in conjunction with 7th Grade civics with a deeper look into the inner-workings of the three branches, the electoral process, and preparation for becoming an informed member of the voting population. The class just spent two chapters on the legislative branch and the powers of the U.S. Congress. Moving forward, they will continue to study the inner workings of our government, including the executive and judicial branches.

-<u>World Geography</u>- The expectation is for each student to carry with them a working knowledge of our U.S. Geography in relationship to the World Geography that surrounds us. In the end, they will have covered the globe---with the goal being that they can compare and contrast our American geography to that of other countries and how that has continued to shape world history. We are currently doing report/poster projects over the countries of Europe.

-<u>Current Issues</u>- The students have spent their year discussing the modern problems we face and the possible solutions to those issues. Through current

events, documentaries, and their own reflections on the world we live in, they continue to work on building their own working knowledge of the world around them. They continue to work on a time capsule project that will include many of the news stories, journal entries, and reflections that they have compiled to date. The goal is to someday look back and see what the world was like during their senior year of 2018-2019.

Thank you for taking a look into our corner of the building, and here's hoping for continued success in 2019 for all of our students and athletes here at CPS-Go Patriots!!!

6th Grade Winter Olympics 2019

Olympics in school? This year, Mr. Faltys, our social studies teacher decided to put a twist on our test about ancient Greece. First we did presentations about a Greek god, and then we got to compete in our own version of the Olympics!

Our 6th Grade Winter Olympics consisted of 5 games; they were called Pentathlon in Ancient Greece. The events that we competed in were the javelin, shot put, curling, broad jump, and foot race. For javelin, we used a PVC pipe and threw it as far as we could. We used a weighted ball to throw for shot put. For the curling competition, we had partners and one person was on a scooter and the other person pushed them across the gym, trying to get to a certain point. Broad jump was for us to show how far we could jump from a standing position.

We completed four different races for the foot race portion of the Olympics. One was to sprint across the gym and back, and we were timed. Then we did a wheelbarrow race with partners, to half court and back. For the third race, we had different partners and we taped our ankles together and we raced across the gym and back. The last race was to run 5 laps around the gym.

Mr. Faltys told us, "The Olympics originated in Greece, which we were studying at the time and I thought it would be fun to put on our own version. I thought your class would enjoy competing against one another." We asked him what his favorite part was and he said, "What I liked the most about the Olympics was seeing the kids compete and have fun doing it. The competitors had two events where they teamed up with a classmate to compete and three events that were on their own. Out of all the events, curling was my favorite because one student was the stone and the other teammate was the pusher of the stone."

Now that you've heard from the man who started our Olympics, we need to hear from the athletes. "I thought it was fun, some people got competitive, but at least we tried," Gabby explained. Jerzzi said, "Some people didn't know how to do the events but they tried hard and learned how to do it." Rylee, who placed second, said, "I had fun! All in all I had a good time with my classmates."

Mr. Faltys even kept score of the results. Everyone got points for the events but they increased with those that got first, second, third, and so on. The final top three competitors were: Cadence Indra in first with 95 points, Rylee Balzer in second with 85 points, and Rosie Guillen in third with 79 points.

Somethings that we learned from this experience, is the Olympics made strong bonds between competitors. We also learned how to have fun and do the events with classmates and laugh at ourselves. We also learned good sportsmanship and how to work with teammates. We realize that this may be the end of our Olympic journey ... *just* maybe.

Wrapping up your senior year

Seniors...stay on track to college by completing these second-semester tasks:

Complete the financial aid process. By now, you should have filed your FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). If you haven't, apply at <u>fafsa.gov</u>.

Compare financial aid awards. The colleges you listed on your FAFSA will send you notifications detailing the financial aid they're offering. Compare the notifications to determine which school provides the best package.

Watch your grades. If you slack off and get poor grades, your college admission could be revoked.

Apply for scholarships. See <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at **EducationQuest.org** to find Nebraska-based scholarships. You'll also find links to national scholarship sites that are EducationQuest-approved.

Make your final college selection. Notify the other colleges so they can take you off their mailing list.

Be aware of deadlines to accept financial aid and college admission offers, submit your housing deposit, and register for new-student orientation.

Juniors...it's time to narrow your college choices.

Narrow your college choices soon to prepare for these upcoming activities:

ACT college entrance exam. When you take the exam this spring, you'll be asked to provide a list of colleges that should receive your score.

Completion of the <u>FAFSA</u> early next fall. You and your parents can complete the FAFSA beginning October 1 of your senior year. The colleges you list on the form will receive the results.

Apply2College Campaign. Early next fall, it will be time to apply to your top college choices. You'll get help with your applications if your high school holds a college application event as part of the statewide <u>Apply2College campaign</u>.

Campus visits will help you narrow your choices

Your spring break is a perfect time to visit schools that interest you. Schedule your visits at least two weeks in advance and be prepared with <u>questions to ask</u>. Find more tips in the <u>"Selecting a College" section</u> at **EducationQuest.org**.

You'll also want to check out these college-search resources at EducationQuest.org:

- <u>"About Nebraska Colleges</u>" provides cost and contact information for Nebraska colleges.
- <u>College Profiles</u> has information about colleges in Nebraska and across the country.

Go on a scavenger hunt and you might win \$500 for college



I want to make this as smooth as possible. If your child attends 4 year-old pre-school at Clarkson Public School they will be picked up at 9:45. If your child does not attend preschool at Clarkson Public School you may drop your child off

in the Kindergarten room at 10:00. They may be picked up between 12:45 and 1:00. Children will eat hot lunch at school and the cost of hot lunch is \$2.65. It may be taken from an older siblings account or paid by cash.

Who is eligible for kindergarten? Anyone who fits the age requirements – 5 years of age by July 31st, 2019. Please check your mail sometime in the second week of April. I will send all forms needed to enroll your student at Clarkson Public Schools. I will also enclose a cover letter of additional information. I like to send these forms out before you bring your kids to Round-up. This way I can better answer your questions and make that first day of school a great experience. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to call me at school, 892-3454. If you need transportation to school for Round-up please contact the school.

We will need a copy of an official copy of the student's birth certificate when the 2019–2020 school year begins. This is a Nebraska state law.

To receive a birth certificate by mail, send a \$17.00 check or money order (credit cards are not accepted) and the following information:

- * Full name at birth. If adopted, list adoptive name and state "adopted".
- * Month/day/year of birth
- * City or town of birth/County of birth
- * Father's full name, if adopted, list the adopted father's name.
- * Mother's full maiden name, if adopted, list adoptive mother's name.
- * Purpose for the record?
- * If not your record, how are you related?
- * Requestor's Photo Identification is Required, i.e. drivers license
