From the Superintendent's Desk

On Wednesday, March 10th Clarkson Public School will be hosting our School Improvement (CIP which stands for Continual School Improvement) visit with an external team of four educators from other school districts and ESU's across the state. All public Nebraska schools are on a fiveyear cycle where a school district looks at data and picks a goal on an area of improvement for the next five years. During this five-year period the school district works to improve scores in the area they have picked and keeps track of data, trainings and their plan to improve on the selected goal. The external team will meet with our CIP Committee, school board members, students and community members along with walking around and observing us throughout the day and then give us a report on what they liked and recommendations for moving forward.

In our past two CIP cycles we have gone with Reading Comprehension and Math Computation. This cycle we chose increasing vocabulary across the curriculum. We picked this goal for two-fold reason. First it allowed us a goal that would work across all curricular areas, not just one area. Second, we felt by improving vocabulary we could improve student scores on MAPS and ACT and increase the student's ability to know and use the English language.

Parent Teacher Conferences are scheduled for Tuesday, March 2nd from 5:00-8:00 pm. If you don't feel comfortable with the Covid scenario please reach out to your teachers and they will work with you either through email or some virtual form to discuss your child's progress.

February is the time of the year where school and activities get hectic, there aren't a lot of scheduled days off from school and activities are in maximum drive. Basketball and wrestling are going through the pressure filled time of conference meets/tournaments and district competition and add in Jr. Hi and Youth teams are winding up there seasons with their final tournaments families are kept on the run. To add more to the plate, February is a big month for the Speech team. Their season has begun and kids are missing school for meets and also having Saturday meets to attend. With the students being involved in so many activities and their busy schedules please remind your children to make sure they are getting the rest and nutrition they need with their active lives and keeping up on their grades.

February is also part of the year where the planning for next school year begins to pick up. We will be approving the 2021-22 school calendar at this month's school board meeting and will be posting it on the school website so families can plan accordingly.

News and Notes from the Social Science Department

We are so grateful to have the students IN SCHOOL for the start of 2021! The school year has been flying by here in the Social Science Department of Clarkson Public School. Here are a few of our highlights so far:

- -8th Grade American History- This class begins by looking at our Native American and European roots and how these two cultures interacted early on in U.S. history. Emphasis is given to European exploration, early British Colonies, and the ensuing development of our nation from its' War for Independence from Great Britain to its' own U.S. Civil War.
- -10th Grade American History- This class has been exploring the events and the brave men and women who preserved our American way of life during WWII. The students will soon understand that the following "Cold War" period may turn out to be the most dangerous period of American History yet. We will then move through the conflicts and social change of the late 20th Century that helped shape America for the new millennium.
- -7th Grade Civics- This group has been given an introductory look into our country, our government, and our uniquely American way of life. There is an emphasis on patriotism, civic duty, and the rights and responsibilities of being a citizen of the United States. Great focus is also given to the Constitution, the 27 Amendments, and the role of the Three Branches of Government
- -American Government- This upper level course is taught in conjunction with 7th Grade civics with a deeper look into the inner-workings of the three branches, the electoral process (a very interesting topic this year), and preparation for becoming an informed member of the voting population. The class just finished studying the judicial branch and the vast powers of the U.S. Supreme Court.
- -World Geography- The expectation is for each student to carry with them a working knowledge of our U.S. Geography in relationship to the World Geography that surrounds us. In the end, we will cover the entire globe---with the goal being that they can compare and contrast our American geography to that of all the other countries of the world.

-Current Issues- The students have spent their year discussing the modern problems we face and the possible solutions to those issues. Through current events, documentaries, and their own reflections on the world we live in, they continue to work on building their own working knowledge of the world around them. The class continues to work on a time capsule project that will include all of the news stories, journal entries, and reflections that they have compiled to date. The goal is to someday look back and see what the world was like during 2020-2021 (and what a year it has been!).

Thank you for taking a look into our corner of the building, and here's hoping for continued success in 2021 for all of our students and athletes here at CPS-Go Patriots!!!

Seniors...make sure you complete the FAFSA process

Getting financial aid for college involves more than completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Complete each step of the process so that you don't miss out on money for college.

- 1. If you haven't already, complete your 2021-22 FAFSA at studentaid.gov using 2019 income tax data. Before you start, you and a parent must each create a Student Aid account. If you need help with your FAFSA, contact EducationQuest to set up a free virtual appointment.
- **2. Expect a Student Aid Report (SAR) via an email link.** The SAR acknowledges that your FAFSA was received and lets you know if you need to take further action before the form can be processed.
- **3. You might receive a verification notice** from the college(s) you listed on your FAFSA requesting documents to verify your FAFSA information. The college will not process your financial aid until you provide required documents.
- **4. Watch for financial aid award notifications.** Once you're accepted for admission to the colleges you listed on your FAFSA, they will notify you of the types and amounts of financial aid they're offering.

Watch your email and student portal carefully for important details from colleges about admission and financial aid.

What you need to know about scholarships

Most scholarships are based on academics, but others are based on community service, school involvement, or talent. Some are based on financial need as determined by the results of your FAFSA.

Here's where to look for scholarships:

- 1. <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at EducationQuest.org houses over 2,000 Nebraska-based scholarships. After you create a profile, you'll be matched with scholarships that fit your criteria. You'll also find links to national sites that EducationQuest recommends.
- 2. Your school counselor's office. Visit regularly to check on local and national awards.
- 3. **The college you plan to attend**. Contact the school for a list of scholarships they provide and the application procedures.
- 4. **Other resources** could include your coach, clubs and organizations, and your parents' employers and civic organizations.
