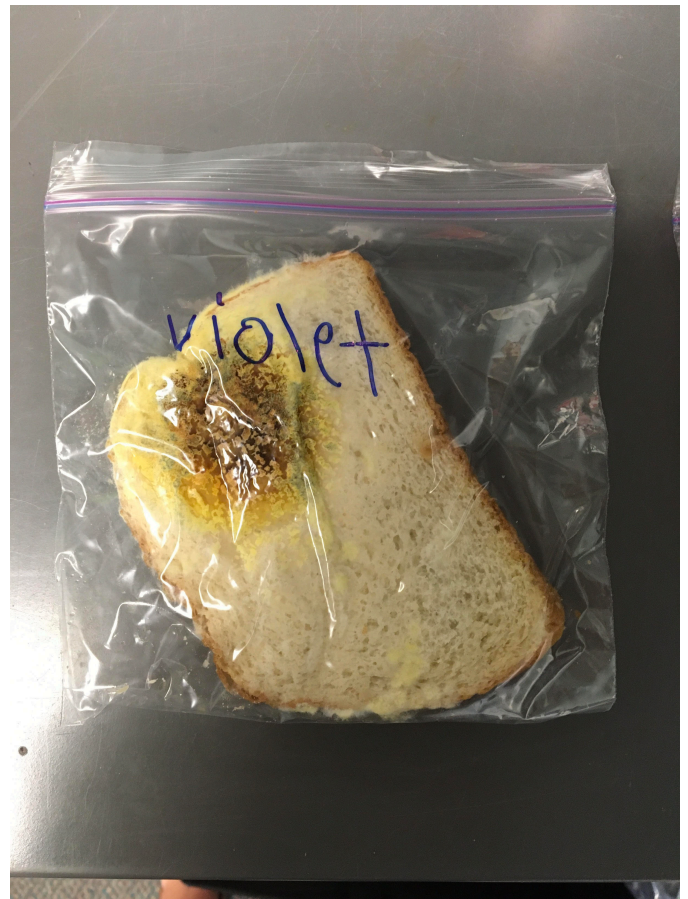

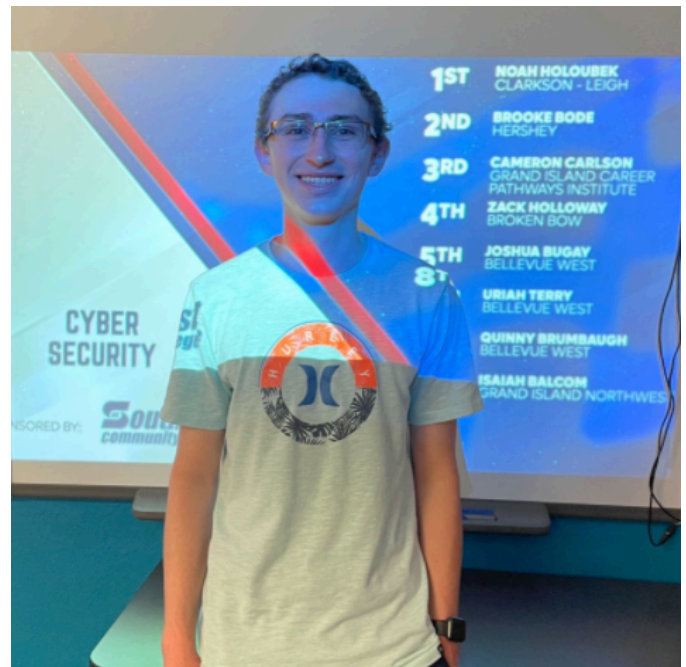
Public Notice

1st graders graduate from the INSIGHTS in Nebraska program

On April 20th, Mrs. Nemecek's first-grade students graduated from the INSIGHTS in Nebraska program. Over the past two years, this group of first-grade students has been participating in a social-emotional curriculum called, INSIGHTS into Children's Temperament. Starting in kindergarten, these students have been learning about how they are unique while using puppets, videos, songs, and storyboards. The students have also had opportunities to become puppeteers and use their newfound skills to observe and think about others' differences with empathy and compassion. Students also learn how to identify a social dilemma, generate and evaluate possible solutions, and use the most helpful solution.

The INSIGHTS program was brought to Clarkson Public School from the Nebraska Center for Research on Children, Youth, Families, and Schools at UNL with a grant from the U.S. Department of Education. We are rounding 3rd on this school year. It has been a great spring of school and track meets. In the world of Physical Education we are trying to attack spring sports and activities. With the young ones we are working on baseball/kickball rules and skills. Hopefully we will be getting our elementary ready for field day in the next couple weeks, can't wait! We are also starting a wiffle ball unit with the freshman after a very competitive, at times chippy, ultimate frisbee tournament. The seniors are also using some frisbee skills with our makeshift Disc Golf course. I was impressed with the overall scores the first couple of rounds and maybe there is a future there for some of them.





During PEP (Patriot Enrichment Period) the 6th grade students were finding recipes online, comparing prices, ordering groceries, followed by making the recipes. The recipes we made were chocolate mousse, edible cookie dough, orange sherbert punch, and sausage and egg breakfast quesadillas. We included the recipes so you can try them too!

Sausage and Egg Breakfast Quesadillas

Sausage and egg breakfast quesadillas are an easy and filling breakfast option that is also freezer-friendly, so you can stock up for later!

Prep Time 5 mins Cook Time 20 mins Total Time 25 mins

Ingredients

- 8 oz. country sausage
- 6 large eggs
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 6 oz. cheddar
- 6 medium flour tortillas

Instructions

1. Add the sausage to a skillet and cook over medium heat until the sausage is browned and crispy on the edges. When the sausage is cooked, remove it from the skillet using a slotted spoon so the grease stays behind in the skillet.
2. While the sausage is cooking, crack six eggs into a bowl and season with salt and pepper (about 1/4 tsp each). Whisk the eggs. Shred the cheddar cheese.
3. Add the whisked eggs to the skillet with the sausage grease, and continue to cook them over medium heat, gently folding them as the eggs set. Cook until the eggs are set, but still moist. Remove the skillet from the heat.
4. With the skillet off the heat, add the cooked sausage and shredded cheddar to the skillet with the scrambled eggs. Fold the ingredients together until they are evenly combined.
5. Place about 1/2 cup of the sausage, egg, and cheese mixture into each tortilla, spreading it out to cover half of the tortilla. Fold the tortilla closed. You can either toast or freeze the quesadillas at this point (see freezing instructions above the recipe).
6. To cook the quesadillas, add them back to the skillet (I like to do this in a dry skillet) and cook over medium heat on each side until the tortilla is brown and crispy and the cheese on the inside is melted. Slice the quesadilla into three pieces, then serve.

Creamy Orange Sherbet Punch

Orange punch can be the sweet combination of orange sherbet, vanilla ice cream with orange Hawaiian Punch and a bit of Sprite to give it a little fizz to create this fun creamy orange sherbet punch.

Prep Time 10 mins Total Time 10 mins

Ingredients

- 1 quart orange sherbet
- 1 quart vanilla ice cream
- 1 gallon Orange Ocean Hawaiian Punch
- 1 liter Sprite

Instructions

1. In a large punch bowl, combine scoops of the orange sherbet and vanilla ice cream. 2. Pour the Hawaiian Punch and the Sprite over the ice cream. 3. Stir to break up the ice cream scoops. 4. Serve in small punch glasses.

3-Ingredient Chocolate Mousse

This 3-Ingredient Chocolate Mousse is light, chocolate-y, smooth and whips up in less than 5 minutes. It's a perfect dessert for any night of the week!

Ingredients

1 1/2 cups HEAVY whipping cream
1/4 cup cocoa powder (dutch preferred), sifted, use 1/3 cup for DARK chocolate flavor
1/2 cup powdered sugar, use 1/4 cup for DARK chocolate flavor
1/4 teaspoon almond extract, optional

Instructions

1. In a chilled mixing bowl, begin whipping cream. Whip until frothy and slightly thicken. 2. Add powdered sugar and cocoa powder. Carefully mix until soft peaks form. 3. Add almond extract if desired. Whip until stiff peaks form. 4. Spoon into plastic bag or piping bag with piping tip. Pip into serving bowls or glasses. 5. Enjoy immediately or refrigerate until ready to serve. Notes Chilling your mixing bowl will help the cream whip more easily. Sift cocoa powder to avoid dark flecks in mousse. Add 1/4 cup powdered sugar to start. If you'd like a sweeter mousse, add sugar up to an additional 1/2 cup. YIELD: 2 1/2 CUPS MOUSSE PREP TIME 5 minutes

Edible Cookie Dough

How to make completely edible cookie dough! This recipe uses no eggs and includes instructions for heat-treating flour to make it safe to eat! Be sure to check out the quick & simple how-to video! Course Cookies, Dessert Cuisine American Prep Time 10 minutes Cook Time 5 minutes Total Time 15 minutes Servings 8 servings Author Sam Merritt

Ingredients

1 ¾ cup all-purpose flour (215g)
1 cup unsalted butter softened to room temperature! (226g)
1 ¼ cups brown sugar, tightly packed (250g)
¼ cup sugar (50g)
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
½ teaspoon salt
1-2 Tablespoons milk optional¹
½ cup semisweet chocolate chips I recommend using a mix of mini and regular sized (85g)

Optional Mix-Ins

creamy peanut butter
colored sprinkles
broken Oreo pieces .

Instructions

1. Preheat your oven to 350F. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper and spread flour in an even layer over the parchment paper.
2. Bake on 350F (72C) oven for 5-7 minutes²
3. Allow flour to cool, then run it through a sifter to break up any clumps that may have formed while baking. Set aside. .
4. In a large bowl (preferably a stand mixer), combine softened butter, sugar, vanilla extract, and salt. Use an electric mixer to cream together until very creamy and very well combined, 1-3 minutes.
5. Gradually add cooled, sifted flour, stirring until completely combined. If dough is too stiff after thoroughly stirring, add milk, one tablespoon at a time, until desired consistency is reached.
6. Stir in chocolate chips (and any additional add-ins you might like!)
7. Store cookie dough in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to one week. Cookie dough will firm up some in the refrigerator, so for best enjoyment let it sit at room temperature for 15-20 minutes before enjoying leftovers.

Notes

¹I've never needed to use milk, but if your cookie dough is too stiff/crumbly add milk as needed, one Tablespoon at a time, to reach desired consistency. ²To ensure your flour is safe, I highly recommend using an instant read thermometer to check that temperature has reached 160F (72C) immediately after removing from the oven. Make sure your thermometer is inserted in the flour and isn't touching/reading the temperature of the pan

A Bit of Clarkson History

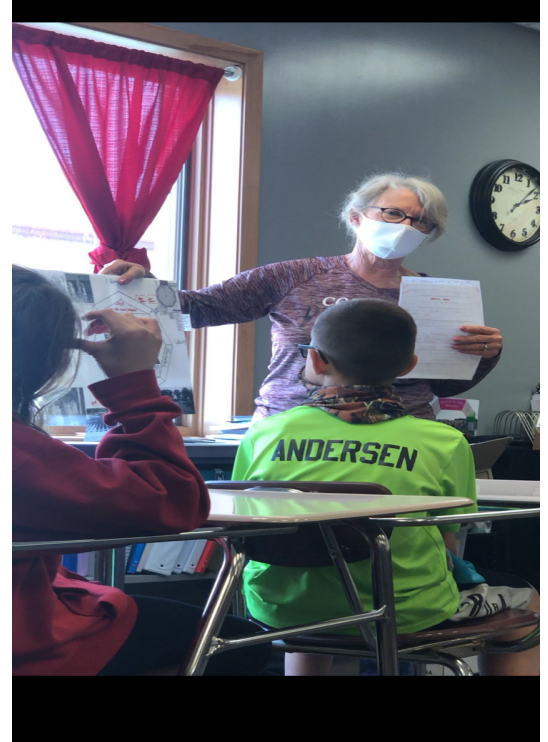

Investing in the future of our town also means teaching our students about the past. What started as a topic of discussion in 6th grade reading class, led to a little field trip and local history lesson. On Monday, Mrs. Sayers, Mr. Faltys, and the 6th graders ventured out to the old ballroom that is located north of Clarkson. We walked about a mile because of the broken bridge, which ironically is where Chelsy Matthies, a 6th grader, told us about her grandpa's truck that fell through during harvest. She shared the picture of the truck after it had fallen through. After our visit to the bridge, we continued to the floor of the ballroom. It was surprisingly in good condition, with the center beam still standing.

Tom Holoubek even stopped by to share what he remembered of the building and its history. He showed us how the octagon floor was made, where the bathrooms were outside, and what the walls were made of. We imagined the dances that took place on that star decorated floor almost 100 years ago. Sharon Cerv was willing to come to school to share stories and pictures with us. The 6th graders were surprised at all of the dances that took place there, starting late and going late. They never thought about windows being all they had for air conditioning, bringing their kids for the late nights, and just how cheap ten cents sounds for a night of entertainment!

Sharon told about weddings starting at 10:00 am and feeding their guests two meals ending with a dance at the ballroom. Weddings happening so often after World War II that they were even during the week! She said during dances the men stood on one side, women on the other, and kids would often fall asleep on the benches lining the walls. Sharon told us that all drinks were in glass bottles and worth turning in for the two cents each! We use livestock water tanks for drinks on ice and that was a regular way to keep drinks cold back then. The last prom was held at the old ballroom in 1966. Since then the building has not been kept up.

The conversation then led to the history of other buildings in town. The 6th graders were surprised by all of the ice cream shops, cafes, a drug store, and even a candy shop! They would love to have that available now! Clarkson has an interesting history and by sharing that with each other, we are inspiring growth for the future!



Spanish News

As we near the end of the 2020-2021 school year, and I reflect on everything that's happened in my classroom since we started in August, I am SO grateful that we have had the opportunity to learn in person this entire year! Last year we learned that we *can* adapt, there are other ways that we *could* learn, but having the chance to talk to students individually when there are little pockets of extra time or observing them interact with their peers allows me to get to know who each of them is as a person and build relationships with them, and that's the most important part of a teacher's job!

The 7th graders are learning a lot in the Spanish room! They participated in an out-of-fashion show to show off what they had learned during our clothing and colors unit. They also had a unit full of school supplies and useful phrases, so they're really adept now at following my instructions (in Spanish) to put their computers in their book bags or get out their notebook and so on. We are currently reviewing the alphabet and learning a little bit about Spanish pronunciation. They'll be able to sound out new words like pros by next week! This group has also really enjoyed learning and competing with Quizlet live for most of our units.

The Spanish 1 students are delving into *Comida Callejera*. Who doesn't like to talk about food?! We are uncovering some popular street foods like *empanadas* and *tacos*, among many others. The tacos that most of us are accustomed to are a far cry from authentic tacos, so there's plenty to learn! We talked about places to eat and gave our opinion by writing a review. We are comparing the price of eating some of these foods in a restaurant versus making them at home. We'll also be able to ask and answer a myriad of questions about the foods and restaurants before the unit is over. Before all this talk about food makes me hungry, I'd better move on Spanish 2!

Arte Callejero (Street Art) is our current unit. We identified different types of street art from street performances to graffiti and more. Students explored the range of messages that can be sent through street art, they designed their own artistic names, and pondered the benefits versus the problems created by street art (Is it art or is it vandalism?). Coming up, students will attempt to connect with an artist, compare different types and qualities of street performances, and carry on a conversation to tell what they know, express their opinion, suggest solutions, and more!

Spanish 3 has been watching *El Norte*, a movie about a brother and sister who immigrate to the U.S. from Guatemala to escape imminent danger, and we follow them in all of the difficulties they face during their journey. We used this as a starting point to learn about what motivates a person to immigrate and the differences between legal and illegal immigration, as well as the process of becoming a U.S. citizen. We have also investigated some of the problems associated with immigration in healthcare, education and other settings. This group sure enjoys a great debate!
