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
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Kindness Matters!

News and Notes from the Social Science Department

The 2021-22 school year has been very interesting here in the Social Science Department of Clarkson Public School. Here are a few of our highlights so far this year:

<u>-8th Grade American History</u>. This class begins by looking at our Native American and European roots and how these two cultures interacted early on in U.S. history. Emphasis is given to European exploration, early British Colonies, and the ensuing development of our nation from its War for Independence from Great Britain to its own U.S. Civil War.

-<u>10th Grade American History</u>- This class has been exploring the events and the brave men and women who preserved our American way of life during WWII. The students will soon understand that the following "Cold War" period may turn out to be the most dangerous period of American History yet. We will then move through the conflicts and social change of the late 20th Century that helped shape America for the new millennium.

-<u>7th Grade Civics/World Studies</u>- This group has been given an introductory look into our country, our government, and our uniquely American way of life in comparison to other regions of the globe. There is an emphasis on patriotism, geography, civic duty, and the rights and responsibilities of being a citizen of the United States. Great focus is also given to the Constitution, the 27 Amendments, and the role of the Three Branches.

-<u>American Government</u>- This upper-level course is taught in conjunction with 7th Grade civics with a deeper look into the innerworkings of the three branches, the electoral process, and preparation for becoming an informed member of the voting population. The class just finished studying the role public opinion and the media play in our society.

-<u>World Geography</u>- The expectation is for each student to carry with them a working knowledge of our U.S. Geography in relationship to the World Geography that surrounds us. In the end, we will cover the entire globe---with the goal being that they can compare and contrast our American geography to that of all the other countries of the world.

-<u>Current Issues</u>- The students have spent their year discussing the modern problems we face and the possible solutions to those issues. Through current events, documentaries, and their own reflections on the world we live in, they continue to work on building their own working knowledge of the world around them. The class continues to work on a time capsule project that will include all of the news stories, journal entries, and reflections that they have compiled to date. The goal is to someday look back and see what the world was like during 2021-2022.

Thank you for taking a look into our corner of the building, and here's hoping for continued success in 2022 for all of our students and activities here at CPS- Go Patriots!!!

Spanish News


¡*Hola*! We are fully in gear as we start up with classes again in 2022. The students are beginning to explore new units. Keep in mind as you read this article in English about the highlights of our class, the students are completing all of these tasks in Spanish! They hear class activity instructions in Spanish, they watch Youtube videos in Spanish, they read articles in Spanish, and they summarize what they saw or read in Spanish or compare their opinion of it with a classmate in Spanish and so on. We don't just talk about all of these Hispanic people or events in English. They are immersed in the Spanish language during the majority of class time each day while focusing on completing a daily goal such as "I can give basic info about the life and career of Hispanic athletes". They are learning content AND a new language simultaneously!

I am super excited to roll out the Adiós Textbook curriculum to the junior high students this year! I think being able to provide continuity of class format between junior high and high school will help students as they won't have to adjust to entirely new expectations their freshman year, as well as it will help them be able to achieve higher proficiency sooner and a higher overall proficiency at the end of the Spanish program. One of the highlights of the 8th graders first unit was that they were so impressed with themselves! One day our goal was, "I can tell what I like about my school". Students were learning how to tell their favorite class(es), and I told them all about my favorite classes, not-so-favorite classes, which ones were hard for me and why. With pictures, gestures, and lots of cognates (words that look/sound similar in two languages), most of the students understood the entire paragraph of information that I had told them in Spanish! They were so proud of themselves! Building up their confidence is a huge key to successful language learning!


Spanish 1 is exploring the world of sports. They can talk about sports they like to play or watch and give their opinion about them. They gave their opinion about some extreme sports as well. Students can give basic info about an athlete, such as their sport, team, position or jersey number. Students identified important characteristics for athletes of various sports. After comparing Kobe Bryant to soccer player Lionel Messi, students were surprised to learn that Messi is more famous world-wide than Kobe is. Students then researched and compared some Hispanic athletes of their own. Students are currently making campaigns to promote an athlete for an award for Univision Premios Deportes, a Hispanic sports awards program.

Spanish 2 is in a unit called Viviendo una vida sana (Living a healthy life). This is a fun opportunity to look at what it means to live a healthy life, beyond just food and exercise. They are exploring ideas like getting sufficient sleep; identifying stressors, talking about the effect of stress on our minds and bodies. and managing stress; the effect music has on our emotions; good and bad uses of technology; and investigating different ways companies promote healthy habits. Students even tried meditation and yoga and they identified their biggest stresses as keeping up with school work and balancing a busy schedule.

Spanish 3/4 has spent some time creating their own games, refining them after trial runs & playing them with the whole class. It has been fun to see their creativity in game design as well as their understanding of the different proficiency levels as that was part of the strategy in how they set up their games.
