Math News

The end of the year is hectic as always as a result of student absences for track, golf, and various other events. Summer is in sight so we have to work hard to keep our focus so we keep moving forward. April and the beginning of May are spent working with logarithms, exponential functions and the trigonometric functions of Sine, Cosine and Tangent.

The geometry classes applied the Pythagorean Theorem and used the trig functions while working with right triangles. They also learned to apply the Law of Sines and Cosines to non-right triangles. Algebra II learned to solve exponential equations/inequalities and to use and apply various properties of logarithms.

Pre-Calculus worked with various trig functions. As we scramble to the end of the year, we will have to do a flurry of testing. The students will complete Star Math tests, NSCAS tests and then review and take final exams.

Spanish News

The 7th graders are working on a unit called Volando cometas (flying kites). They are able to describe all kinds of kites (size, color, shape). They can tell what kind of weather would or would not be ideal for flying a kite. They have been exploring several different kite festivals. They will soon be able to talk about different activities with kites and give their opinion about them. I think the highlight of the unit will be following a Spanish tutorial to make kites of their own; and then, of course, we will just have to test them out!

The Spanish 1 students are delving into Comida Calleiera. Who doesn't like to talk about food?! We are uncovering some popular street foods like *empanadas* and *tacos*, among many others. The tacos that most of us are accustomed to are a far cry from authentic tacos, so there's plenty to learn! We will talk about places to eat and give our opinion by writing a review. We are comparing the price of eating some of these foods in a restaurant versus making them at home. We'll also be able to ask and answer a myriad of questions about the foods and restaurants before the unit is over.

Spanish 2 is on their last unit of the year, Desayunos del mundo (Breakfast around the world). They've looked at resources about the benefits of eating breakfast, learned about iconic breakfasts in several Spanish-speaking countries, compared breakfasts in various countries, spent 2 entire days just talking about cereal, compared several different breakfast drinks, used reviews to pick a new restaurant they'd like to visit for breakfast, and evaluated their own breakfast habits (they'll be making a plan for how to improve their habits soon as well). They will get a chance to promote a special breakfast from their own neighborhood (My guess is kolaches will top the list!), and they'll have conversations about all topics breakfast.

Spanish 3/4 has had a lot of conversation and game days the last few weeks. This group is involved in so many school activities, it seems like most of them have been gone more days than not; it's difficult to have "normal" lessons. However, it has worked out well. Conversations with the small groups that have been here have afforded them all more opportunity to practice their talking skills and I can tailor the convo to fit their individual interests and language level better. Game days have also been great language practice. Bananagrams allows them to "play" with their words (recognize opportunities to change masculine/feminine. singular/plural or the form of the verb, etc.) to get rid of more of their tiles. Password helps them build

circumlocution skills (being able to talk around a word they don't know). Story Cubes help them with flexibility; they have to incorporate everything they've heard so far when it's their turn. These are some of the games they've been playing and they ALL help build solid language skills!

- Set a goal each time on how many you'd like to make and shoot until you hit goal - Mark down your makes in the correct categories and keep a running total for the summer - Categories include:

- Free Throws, 3's (only if in your range), Elbow, Wing, Corner, Post Moves, and Finishing Moves at Rim

- Ball Handling: for every 15 minutes of ball handling you complete, you get to count 30 shots towards your total (Examples include: 2 ball dribbling, attacking work: crossover, behind the back, Isaiah, through the legs, hesitation, spin)

Things to remember when shooting:

1- Great form each shot, set feet, guide hand is a guide hand only, follow through 2- Consistency of shot (same shot every time, become confident in being a great shooter) 3- Follow through with your shooting hand (snap wrist, grab cookies out of jar) 4- If you ever need help with shot, please contact Coach Murren and he'd be glad to help!






Injection Molding Essentials: (2 Days) June 15&16

Participant will fully grasp the elements and variables involved in the injection molding process and learn key terminology that will help them communicate and solve molding problems. Fundamentals of Systematic Molding: (4 Days)

June 20 –23

This 4 day course is for technical and non-technical personnel who are associated with production of thermoplastic injection molded components. This course provides hands-on, practical applications that introduce the principles of both injection molding and DECOUPLED MOLDING processes. Areas covered include molding machine construction, process parameter selection, the effect of mold temperature control, material handling, and use of additives with reference to component quality and consistency. Decoupled Molding Workshop: (3 Days)

June 28-30

This workshop is designed to provide students with valuable hands-on machine time to reinforce the methodologies the learned in Systematic Molding. It offers the exact same exercises at Master Molder I, but with half the practice time and none of the testing. Attendees will acquire the knowledge they need to dissect and rebuild the process, document and indicate potential improvement areas using current condition of the mold and machine.

Master Molder 1 (2 weeks) *Optional* July 11-20

This two-week hands-on machine intensive training sets the standard for applied knowledge demonstration of strategic plastic injection molding methods for an entry level mold technician in the manufacturing setting. Students will learn to apply methods and techniques in injection molding from the plastic's point of view. Students will be able to demonstrate the development of a Decoupled II process using the skills obtained in this training that can be applied immediately in industry.
