The end of the year is hectic as always as a result of student absences for track, golf, and various other events. Summer is in sight so we have to work hard to keep our focus so we keep moving forward


April and the beginning of May are spent working with logarithms, exponential functions and the trigonometric functions of Sine, Cosine and Tangent. The geometry classes applied the Pythagorean Theorem and used the trig functions while working with right triangles. They also learned to apply the Law of Sines and Cosines to non-right triangles.

Algebra II learned to solve exponential equations/inequalities and to use and apply various properties of logarithms. PreCalc worked with various trig functions. As we scramble to the end of the year, we will have to do a flurry of testing. The students will complete Star Math tests, NSCAS tests and then review and take final exams.


## Public Notice



## Three 8th Graders placed third in Tech Contest

The Nebraska Educational Service Units (ESUs) held their annual Digital Citizenship Symposium online again this year! The outreach was impressive because of the flexibility of the online delivery of digital citizenship content.

The content, which was available on the Nebraska Digital Citizenship Symposium website, included information and activities for grades K-4, 5-6, and 7-12. Heather Callihan, Technology Integrationist at Northwest Public Schools and teachers/students from Lincoln Public Schools recorded videos this year that HS students and teachers could access online. ESU staff also curated content for grades K-4 and 5-8. The team of ESU leaders who facilitated the event were very pleased with the participation. The Nebraska DCS website was visited over 4,100 times from October through April by people from all over Nebraska, 8 states, and 5 other countries! Students had the opportunity to earn a certificate of completion for their grade level content, which included Media Balance, Making Good Decisions, and Creation Over Consumption. Almost 600 certificates were awarded to students successfully completing the unit assessments!

The ESU group also hosted a statewide Digital Citizenship Message Contest. Students were invited to submit a Digital Citizenship poster or a Public Service Announcement communicating something they had learned. Students in grades K-12 submitted entries online and were judged in four grade group categories. Of the 132 contest entries,21 award winners were selected and announced in April.

Clarkson Public Schools had a winner this year. Ava Baumert, Hayley Podany and Claire Holoubek earned the third place medals for the Grade 6-8 Public Service Announcement (PSA) Contest. Their teacher is Mr. Matt Murren.

## Spanish News

The 7th graders are working on a unit called *Volando cometas* (flying kites). They are able to describe all kinds of kites (size, color, shape). They can tell what kind of weather would or would not be ideal for flying a kite. They have been exploring several different kite festivals. They will soon be able to talk about different activities with kites and give their opinion about them. I think the highlight of the unit will be following a Spanish tutorial to make kites of their own; and then, of course, we will just have to test them out!

The Spanish 1 students are delving into *Comida Callejera*. Who doesn't like to talk about food?! We are uncovering some popular street foods like *empanadas* and *tacos*, among many others. They chose a Spanish-speaking city around the world and have planned a week-long vacation in that city. I look forward to seeing their final products here soon!


This has been a fantastic school year working with a wonderful group of middle schoolers.


I can't believe it's coming to an end.

4th Grade continued to develop a strong foundation in reading skills and strategies through a variety of texts. Our focus throughout the year included main idea and details, making inferences, comparing and contrasting multiple characters, settings, and stories, analyzing text structures, vocabulary development through word analysis, discussions of text to identify purpose and point of view and to strengthen comprehension.

4th Grade spent a majority of time in writing increasing organizational structure in multiple writing pieces and diving deeper into grammatical concepts. We worked on informational and personal narratives, and strengthened our pieces by applying figurative language and bringing our voice into our writing.

This group of 4th graders chose to work on self-control and flexible mindsets each day in my class. The progress they made was extraordinary!







5th Grade Reading continued to work on developing literacy skills crucial for academic success. In addition to reading and understanding various genres of literature, students participated in book clubs to enhance comprehension and time management skills.

5th Grade Writing involved a deeper understanding of the writing process along with using technology to do research and format our papers on google documents. 5th graders focused on presenting poetry through a poetry slam, writing biographies, and sharing personal narratives.







6th Grade focused on how reading becomes a powerful tool in life to make sense of complex material, find information, and enjoyment in literature. We explored many types of genres and participated in a book club.

6th Grade writing was full of applying critical thinking skills and creativity through project based learning, as well as understanding the writing process. The focus was on personal and fictional narratives & argumentative and persuasive writing. We participated in culmination activities including debates and a Shark Tank

competition.
