As we continue our transition from a traditional grade-based system to an Equitable Grading based grading system I wanted to update everyone with the progress being made during the first semester. We have shared information on the new grading policy and how late work is being handled, to help parents understand how graded practice (formally known as homework) and how it is being handled. We have asked our teachers to pick their "priority standards" for one class as we start the process. The goal is to prioritize our learning and make sure the students are learning and concentrating on the most important standards in each class. By the end of the year the teachers will start to work on priority standards for a 2nd class. As we continue through our process, we will continue to keep parents updated with flyers and other information so everyone can be on the same page.

With the changes we have noticed an increased rigor in the classroom. We are also seeing a truer grade for students as now you can't get bonus points, participation points and also are not punished academically for behaviors in the classroom. Our goal is to make sure that our student's grades give a true reflection of their learning.

Our plan for the full transition to Equitable Grading is a five year process as we want to make sure that it doesn't overwhelm students, staff and parents. As we go through our process, we are being aided by staff developers at ESU 7 as we are one of four schools who are making the transition in the ESU 7 with more to be followed soon. If you have any questions please feel free to reach out and get clarification on any questions or concerns you may have on the process.

Please remember that January and February are very hectic months as we head into the back part of the winter sports/activity season. Between Youth, Jr. Hi, C Team, JV and Varsity contests and then throw in Speech meets and Ag Contests the months of January and February really keep everyone hopping. This doesn't include the joy of dealing with the weather and dealing with postponements and rescheduling of activities. Please make sure you are communicating with your kids and make sure they are keeping up with their work.

English Notes

Remember the days when your first grader came home with a folder of LOOK WHAT I ACCOMPLISHED each Friday? (Senior parents - don't imagine this too hard. No crying; it's not May yet.) I would sit down with my daughter and applaud the smiley faces and try to figure out why the X's didn't make sense to her. Wait, who am I kidding? That never happened. "Oh that's nice! Great job!" (and quietly push the papers to the recycling bin so I could have a clean counter for supper prep). #momoftheyear

More than likely, your high school student isn't bringing home assignments to show you anymore (actually, they may not say ANYTHING about school anymore), but YOU can start that conversation if you are utilizing JMC, Clarkson's online grading platform. "I thought you hated math? Your average says otherwise! Nice work!" Or, "That English grade is starting to dip. What's going on?"

Students and parents can access Clarkson's online grade book 24/7 (contact Amy Gurnsey if you need your login information). On JMC, you can see your student's average, attendance record, and lunch bill. As a teacher I not only use JMC to enter grades that make up student averages, but I also use the grade book to communicate what students are (or are not) turning in.

With the changes in our grading policies, not all assignments are entered as grades. Practice work (done both in and out of class) receives feedback in class, but it may not be a part of the student's average. Regardless, I do record on JMC whether or not a student has turned in the assignment as well as a self-assessment of the work. If you see "HI" and a smiley face next to an assignment, that means it was handed in and the student felt successful with the concepts. A :-/ face means they have some confusion, and :-(means they are totally lost OR they didn't have the assignment complete. If you see an "M," that means the student did not turn in the practice assignment. A missing practice assignment doesn't affect their grade immediately, but it could have implications for future quizzes and tests. If they didn't complete the assignment for feedback, they may not know if they understood the concepts by the time the graded assessment comes around, leading to lower test scores.

Parents can set up alerts through JMC for missing assignments or if a grade dips below a certain percentage. Please take the time to log in to review not only your student's average but to also get a peek at their work ethic in English class.

College Testing Information

ACT Basics

Standardized tests are an important part of the college admissions process. Standardized tests like the ACT are important, not just for college admissions, but also to minimize future college debt by increasing the scholarships and financial aid you earn. Colleges use the ACT to make admissions and scholarship decisions and assess college readiness. In Nebraska, all juniors are required to take the ACT in the spring (at no cost to the student) as the state accountability testing requirement. Students are encouraged to take the ACT additional times to improve their performance. Currently, the test is \$68 however if students are on a federal free and reduced lunch program, they can receive a fee waiver from the counselor. ACT is also currently offering a 2-for-1 charge for students that want to sign up for testing. For more information, please go to www.act.org.

PreACT

Sophomores completed the PreACT this fall. The PreACT is a short, multiple-choice assessment with results predicting performance on the ACT. The PreACT simulates the ACT testing experience within a shorter test window on all four ACT test subjects: English, Math, reading, and science. This test provides early ACT practice and includes an interest inventory and predicted ACT score ranges which align with the ACT 1-36 scale.

The test was taken on November 17th and students received their test results at the beginning of December. An extra copy of each student's results is kept on file in the guidance office.

John Baylor OnToCollege

Clarkson Public School uses John Baylor test prep for the ACT this year. Juniors have accounts created that they can access to independently work on specific topics in preparation for ACT testing. Underclassmen can access this information if interested, visit with Mrs. Kappel. OnToCollege Test Prep includes at-home access for students, ACT Prep and refresher, study skills, and test-taking strategies. Students were invited to participate in lunch sessions with Mrs. Kappel this fall if they were interested and sessions will also be scheduled in the spring prior to state testing during core instruction. State testing will be on Tuesday, March 26th.

5 Ways to Prepare for the FAFSA

EducationQuest

The 2024-25 FAFSA is about to be unveiled for college-bound students and families! With the anticipation of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) opening in December, here are five things you can do now so you're prepared to complete the form as soon as possible.

1. Set up a personal e-mail.

There are changes to the FAFSA that will require the student and parent(s) to have personal email addresses. Students should never use their high school email address for college and FAFSA-related purposes. If the student and/or parent do not have a personal email address, establish one now. There are many free or low-cost email services available.

2. Create FSA IDs.

Both you and at least one parent must create FSA IDs at <u>studentaid.gov</u>. Do this at least three days before completing the FAFSA to allow the Social Security Administration to verify your identity. FSA IDs are used to access the FAFSA, populate tax information onto the form, sign the FAFSA, and apply for direct student loans or Parent PLUS loans. Parents: if you already have an FSA ID from a prior college student, you will use it for the new student's FAFSA as well.

3. Gather all required documents.

Completing the 2024–25 FAFSA will be much easier if you gather all required documents in advance, including your 2022 Federal Income Tax Returns and corresponding schedules. Review our <u>FAFSA Checklist</u> for a list of required information.

4. Know the current value of your assets.

Although the FAFSA will access your 2022 tax return, you will report the current values of your assets as of the day you complete the FAFSA, excluding your primary home and retirement accounts. New this year: The net worth of your farming operation and any businesses you own will now be included in the FAFSA calculation.

5. Apply for college admission.

The colleges you list on the FAFSA will receive your results and use that information to award financial aid. You must apply for admission and be accepted to the college(s) you list on the FAFSA to receive a Financial Aid Offer. Admissions forms can be found on each college's website, so get them filled out and submitted.

Finally, the FAFSA is your application for federal, state, and college-based financial aid. Apply before the colleges' priority filing dates to get the best financial aid package you qualify for, and plan to renew the FAFSA every year you will be in college. Complete the form at <u>studentaid.gov</u>. If you're apprehensive about the FAFSA process, contact the <u>EducationQuest</u> office nearest you to ask questions or to schedule an appointment to get help completing the FAFSA. Remember, our services are completely *FREE*!
