Through innovative job shadowing and paid internship opportunities, Clarkson juniors and seniors are gaining real-world experience that prepares them for life after graduation in powerful, meaningful ways. This program goes beyond learning *about* work, it's about learning *through* work.

Our students are doing things most high schoolers don't get the chance to do. This year, our seniors have participated in meaningful experiences across a wide range of career fields. Students have responded to emergency calls with Norfolk Fire & Rescue, worked hands-on as teacher's aides, gone out on job sites with utility linemen, worked side by side with local mechanics, assisted in veterinary operations, and earned pay as trusted interns.

What truly sets Clarkson apart is the level of trust local employers place in our students. Internship opportunities allow seniors to complete real jobs and take on real responsibilities, because they've earned that trust. Smeal's in Snyder has hired three Clarkson seniors to work in welding, electrical, and engineering. Other students are engaging in paid experiences as vet techs, mechanics, medical clinic aides, and at the West Point sale barn.

Whether that path leads to college, the workforce, or technical training, the Clarkson Career Readiness Program is opening doors, strengthening community partnerships, and giving students a head start toward their futures. Update from the Social Science Department

The 2025-26 school year at Clarkson Public School has been busy and fun so far in the 7-12 Social Studies Room. I hope that you enjoy hearing about some of our highlights:

-8th Grade American History- Begins by looking at our Native American and European roots in North America and how these two cultures interacted early on in U.S. history. Emphasis is given to European exploration, early British Colonies, and the development of our nation from the Revolutionary War with England to the eventual U.S. Civil War. Although they're a quiet group, these students work very hard and are a joy to be around.

-10th Grade American History- Most recently, we've been exploring events and the brave men and women who preserved our American way of life during World War II. The students have now started looking at that "Cold War" with the Soviet Union that followed. We will then move through the conflicts and social change of the late 20th Century that helped shape America into what it is today including the 9/11 Attacks. This group does an amazing job of "question & answer" and being interactive most every day.

-7th Grade Civics/World Studies- This is the group that we try to give an introductory look into our country, our government, and our American way of life in comparison to other regions of the globe. There is an emphasis on patriotism, geography, civic duty, and the rights and responsibilities of being a citizen of the U.S. Great focus is also given to the Constitution, the 27 Amendments, and the role of the Three Branches. Once this group got into their Social Studies class routine, they have done a great job!

-American Government- This upper-level course for the Junior Class is taught in conjunction with 7th Grade civics- with a deeper look into the inner-workings of the three branches, the electoral process, and most important: preparation for becoming an informed and responsible member of the American voting population. The class just finished studying the role of the U.S. Congress and is now focusing on the role of the Executive Branch/U.S. President. This is a great group of students and great group of people to work with.

-World Geography- The expectation for this group is for each student to carry with them a working knowledge of our U.S. Geography in relationship to the World Geography that surrounds us. In the end, we will cover the entire globe--- with the goal being that they can compare and contrast our United States geography/way of life to that of the rest of the world. This is a fun group that work very hard in class and are on the right track.

-Current Issues- These students have spent their grade 7-11 years working up to discussing the modern problems we face and the possible solutions to these issues. Through current events, documentaries, and their own reflections, they continue to work on building a working knowledge of the world around them. This awesome group continues to work on a year-long time capsule project that will include news stories, journal entries, and reflections from this year. In 20 years, the goal is to look back and see what the world was like in the year(s) of 2025-2026.

Thank you for taking a look into our classes, and here's hoping for continued success in 2026 for all of our students here at Clarkson Public Schools.

Spanish Class News

¡Hola! We are fully in gear as we start up with classes again in 2026. Keep in mind as you read this article in English about the highlights of our class, the students are completing all of these tasks in Spanish! They hear class activity instructions in Spanish, they watch Youtube videos in Spanish, they read articles in Spanish, and they summarize what they saw or read in Spanish or compare their opinion of it with a classmate in Spanish and so on. We don't just talk about all of these Hispanic people or events in English. They are immersed in the Spanish language during the majority of class time each day while focusing on completing a daily goal such as "I can give basic info about the life and career of Hispanic athletes". They are learning content AND a new language simultaneously!

Spanish 1 is exploring the world of sports. They can talk about sports they like to play or watch and give their opinion about them. They gave their opinion about some extreme sports as well. Students can give basic info about an athlete, such as their sport, team, position or jersey number. Students identified important characteristics for athletes of various sports. After comparing soccer players Cristiano Ronaldo and Lionel Messi, students then researched and compared some Hispanic athletes of their own. Students just made and shared their campaigns to promote an athlete for an award. They will wrap up the sports unit this week.

Spanish 2 is in a unit called *Viviendo una vida sana* (Living a healthy life). This is a fun opportunity to look at what it means to live a healthy life, beyond just food and exercise. They are exploring ideas like getting sufficient sleep; identifying stressors, talking about the effect of stress on our minds and bodies, and managing stress; the effect music has on our emotions; good and bad uses of technology; and investigating different ways companies promote healthy habits. Students even tried meditation and yoga and they identified their biggest stresses as keeping up with school work and balancing a busy schedule.

Spanish 3 is delving into sporting events. They can give basic info about a sporting event and tell if they would attend it or not. They can tell what both players and fans would wear to a game, they can describe all sorts of fans, and talk about past winners of an event as well as compare the types of prizes the winners get. They can talk about traditions around certain sports/events and give the history of an event. There are just a few lessons left in this unit. They will be telling about their own experiences attending sporting events and practicing making plans to attend an event. This group also continues to hone their intermediate level grammar skills; they've used the preterite tense quite a bit during this unit to tell what's happened in the past.
